Use of DEMONSTRATIVE PRONOUNS



I. WHAT I NEED TO KNOW:

Good morning, kids! I hope you and your families are all well. Today, we will be learning a new lesson. Before we start, have your module, your paper, and your pen ready. Are you ready? Let's go!

Do you remember our lesson on pronouns? Can you give some examples of pronouns?

Today we will be learning a new kind of pronoun. We will learn **how to use** *Demonstrative Pronouns (this, these, that, those) in a sentence.*

II. WHAT I KNOW:

Do you know what demonstrative pronouns are? This short test will see if you know them. Do not worry if you are not able to answer all the questions correctly.



<u>V.WHAT IS IT</u>

The underlined words are called **demonstrative pronouns**. Do you know what **demonstrative pronouns**?

Take a look at the pictures below. Let us read the sentences written under each picture.






<u>This</u> is my pencil.

<u>That</u> is my pencil.









These are my pencils.


Those are my pencils.

Demonstrative pronouns are used for pointing at people and things. The words this, these, that, and those are demonstrative pronouns. They are used to point to persons or things around us.

Look at the pictures below and see how this and that are used in the two sentences.



This is an apple.



That is an apple.

We use the demonstrative pronoun this to point to one person or one object that is near.

We use the demonstrative pronoun "that" to point to **one** person or **one** object that is **far away.**

What about the demonstrative pronouns these and those? How are they used in a sentence?

Again look at the pictures and the sentences below.



These are rulers.

Those are rulers.

We use the demonstrative pronoun "these", to point to many persons or objects that are **near**.

We use the demonstrative pronoun those to point to many persons or objects that are far away.

The chart below may help us remember how to use demonstrative pronouns.

Placement of Object	Singular (one object or per- son)	Plural (many objects or per- sons)
Near	This	These
Far	That	Those


